Beloved, let us love one another, because love is from God; everyone who loves is born of God and knows God. (1 John 4:7 NRSVue)

Dear St. Andrew family of faith,

When you think of the month of February, what first comes to mind?

I know that for myself it is most often something to do with Valentine's Day, and that I am fortunate to primarily associate this day of love not with romantic love, but with the love of agape (pronounced ah-GApay).

Trying to convey the nuances of one of the many ways that the ancient Greeks delineated loving and being loved can sometimes be a futile practice. Some things just cannot be completely translated to another time, place, and way of existing. But, I'm going to try anyway.

When we encounter "love" in scripture, translators have usually translated it from the greek word agape. An agape love refers to a deep and abiding love that does not include romantic feelings. When someone loves with an agape love, they love someone the way a parent loves their child, or siblings love one another. The way in which Jesus loves us and loves the world shows us the way to then love one another, which 1 John 4:7 illustrates.

In college, I was introduced to the artwork and stories of the StoryPeople studio. While the art was initially very off-putting for me—it's quite strange!—the prints that have been gifted to me over the years have become some of my favorite non-biblical good news sources.

"Day One of 365...New Year's morning always feels like turning the first page of a new chapter in a much-loved book. I love that feeling. With a caffeine-enhanced skip of joy in my step, I opened the front door to shake out the welcome mat in anticipation of the friends who'd soon be arriving for brunch. I did a double take. An unexpected blanket of snow



covered my walkway. I looked up. The

Colorado sky was a cloudless, azure blue. Snow hadn't been mentioned on last night's weather forecast for last night or today. Beyond my walkway, which was currently under the protective shadow of the eaves, there was not a hint of snowy white in sight. I phoned my son, who lives five minutes away, and he confirmed that his neighborhood was entirely flake-free.

Weird, I thought. Even for the Rockies. I picked up my broom, but my snow-covered walkway was so perfect, so pristine and untouched, that I hesitated to sweep away the beauty of the freshly fallen flakes. It felt like a God-given picture of my year ahead. A clean slate. No missteps. No wandering in circles. No veering off the path God set before me. So far, anyway. But it was only Day One.

No matter how lovely and perfect that untouched path seemed, I knew life couldn't be lived standing still. I had to move forward, loving and learning my way through the days ahead. I prayed the footprints I left behind me this year would be ones I'd be proud for my grandchildren to follow in. Then I stepped across the threshold and swept away the snow, welcoming in whatever lay ahead."

Father, thank you for forgiving what lies behind me and guiding me forward onto a path of grace and growth... Amen.

The second is Love Works: "Make me a tool of the resistance, I said to the angel, and when I woke up I wanted to hug everyone I could see."

Both of these stories capture the active part of love. The love that God gave to us in Jesus, and continues to give to us through the Holy Spirit, is a love that moves and acts as well as feels.

As we enter the month dedicated to love, we will continue to encounter God's love through worship and the sacraments. On Ash Wednesday we will bear the sign of God's eternal love for us and all creation as we are marked with ash—a sign of our mortality—in the shape of the cross—God's sign of our everlasting life through Christ.

Next month, I'll be more thoroughly introducing our Lenten theme of "Unfinished" but, in the meantime, I will leave you with this consideration: how is God inviting you to love more fiercely, love more intentionally, and to love more fully this Lent? What better time to start thinking about it than this season of love.

Annual Meeting Summary

Sunday, January 29 was our Annual Meeting. After obtaining a quoram the meeting was brought to order by Council Presidnet Leslie Parriott at 12:00 noon. The annual report and agenda were accipted and the meeting moved on to the proposed budget for 2023.

The proposed budget centered around the the anticipated short-fall for expenses this coming year based on our known pledges verses the increases expected due to inflation that has been unusually high.

After a review of the proposed budget it was ammended to reflect a more conservative approach to the expected donations and therefor the budget was past with a possible shortfall of over \$60,000 for 2023. This shortfall will be the focus for the congregation and council as we move into the new year.

It is with with deepest appreciation and gratitude that we thank the four council members that have completed their elected commitment to the church council; Lisa Green, Lyn Hayes, Mary Hanson and Steve Jacobson. All four of them have served multiple terms on the council and have been instramental and dynamic in their approch to directing St. Andrew in persuit of sharing Christ.

We welcome Chrissy Grace and xxxxxxxx xxxxxxxxx to the Council. We appreciate their commitment to future contributions to be leaders in our congregation.

PRAYER VENTURES February 2023

- Black History Month Give thanks for the gifts, accomplishments, influence and witness of our African-descent neighbors and siblings in Christ we stand together to glorify God as partners in the gospel, doing God's work in the world together. Though unified as siblings in Christ, we ask God to guide our church in its pursuit of racial justice, socioeconomic equity, racial reconciliation and an end to hatred and mistrust.
- Give thanks for older adults, whose diverse gifts, life experiences, perspectives and wisdom are essential to the life, vitality and leadership of our congregations and communities.
- Pray for leaders of children, youth and family ministries as these leaders gather for the ELCA Youth Ministry Network Extravaganza in Anaheim, Calif. Give thanks for their commitment, gifts and concern for the faith and well-being of young people.
- Give thanks for staff and volunteers who help congregations function smoothly, grow and thrive, including administrative assistants, accountants, property managers, program coordinators and communications staff.
- Jesus describes us as the salt of the earth and the light of the world. Pray that, by sharing our faith and acting with compassion, justice and care for our neighbors, we might direct people's attention to our loving and generous God.
- ELCA World Hunger works through the Lutheran World Federation (LWF) and alongside global companions and agencies in Kenya to build the capacity of families to respond to and withstand worsening droughts. Pray for our neighbors in Kenya and for the immediate and long-term success of LWF initiatives, which include training farmers in climate-smart practices, building and repairing water wells, managing water supplies and promoting hygiene.
- Remember in prayer those who have suffered tragedy, trauma or loss from recent winter storms, flooding and earthquakes. Pray that

- God will bring them hope and encouragement throughout their grieving, recovery and adjustment to the changes in their communities.
- Pray for pastors and deacons who serve multiple congregations, and pray that congregations sharing leadership will flourish, discovering new partners, resources and assets for doing God's work in the world.
- Pray that our compassion and advocacy, offered without prejudice or the expectation of any recognition or reward, might bring light, hope and relief to the world. "If you remove the yoke from among you, the pointing of the finger, the speaking of evil, if you offer your food to the hungry and satisfy the needs of the afflicted, then your light shall rise in the darkness and your gloom be like the noonday" (Isaiah 58:9-10).
- 10 Remember in prayer the 1.3 million people serving in the military and the nearly 800,000 serving in the military reserves, many of them young adults.
- 11 Give thanks and pray for the ELCA's AMMPA-RO strategy (Accompanying Migrant Minors with Protection, Advocacy, Representation and Opportunities), work that grows more critical every day as vulnerable youth yearn for assistance with the daunting task of finding safety, stability, respect and welcoming communities in our country.
- 12 Pray for people who suffer chronic illness and pain that impacts their daily lives, activities and employment; pray that they might receive affordable health care and effective treatment; and ask the Spirit to stir our empathy and help us provide appropriate, respectful support.
- 13 Pray that our civic engagement and concern for our neighbor and the world might exceed what is required or expected of us by laws, social norms, trends and tradition.
- Ask God to help us understand, respect and set aside our differences so that we might be empowered by our unity in Christ and embrace our complementary gifts and passions to do God's work in the world, "for we are God's servants, working together" (1 Corinthians 3:9).

- Praise God that, as different as we are from one another, we gather to celebrate Communion remembering our unity and strength in Christ, who frees us to love and serve our neighbor and to bear God's mercy into the world.
- 16 Give thanks for the publishing ministry of Augsburg Fortress and for writers and editors who help deepen our faith, equip us for life and service, and support our faith communities.
- 17 Praise God for the clarity and joy we find in following God's ways and commandments, and for the assurance that we are never alone or directionless in our baptismal journeys.
- 18 Martin Luther, renewer of the church (1483-1546) Give thanks for the life, faith, prayerful deliberation, and wisdom of Martin Luther, who continues to influence and challenge the church and our theology. Pray that we might remember Luther's human complexity and imperfections—and our own—as we strive to understand Scripture and live as children of God in an everchanging world.
- We embrace the mystery of the Holy Trinity through the gift of faith. Give thanks that, through Scripture, God leads us to clarity about the true nature of Jesus Christ, who was sent to redeem us and to teach us how to live as children of God: "This is my Son, the Beloved; with him I am well pleased; listen to him!" (Matthew 17:5).
- World Day of Social Justice Pray that our concern for social justice in the world will be grounded in our faith, Jesus' example and the ways and wisdom of God, emboldening us to serve our neighbor, respect one another and risk changing unjust laws, traditions, institutions and behaviors.
- 21 Shrove Tuesday Ask the Spirit to prepare our hearts for the season of Lent and to create in us a humble, penitent spirit that is renewed daily through faith in God's forgiveness and love, revealed and experienced in Jesus Christ.

- 22 Ash Wednesday "Create in me a clean heart, O God, and put a new and right spirit within me" (Psalm 51:10). Give thanks for the cross of ash drawn on our foreheads today, which assures us of God's forgiveness, love and renewing spirit.




