From Pastor Jenna Pulkowski Pastor's Pen

“With what shall I come before the Lord, and bow myself before God on high? Shall I come before him with burnt offerings, with calves a year old? ⁷Will the Lord be pleased with thousands of rams, with ten thousands of rivers of oil? Shall I give my firstborn for my transgression, the fruit of my body for the sin of my soul?” ⁸He has told you, O mortal, what is good; and what does the Lord require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God?
(Micah 6:6-8 NRSVUE)



As you have (hopefully) noticed, our worship schedule is shifting for the summer. The last couple of years we have tried a blended worship service, but we struggled to find the right balance of music and worship styles. This summer, we will be mostly alternating our worship styles, although we will not be posting a schedule should that alternation change.

I worry about the strong opposition to a worship style that is different from our individually preferred style. Y'all are quick to share your thoughts and feelings. While the comments are mostly tempered by "it's fine that other people like that style, but this is what I prefer", sometimes the reactions and comments are borderline—or just outright!—unkind.

Micah 6:8 is a popular verse amongst many Christians—myself included—who appreciate clarity in what God requires of us: "...to do justice, love kindness, and to walk humbly with your Lord".

The rest of chapter 6—the rest of Micah—focuses on God's frustrations with their people and with the religious and political leaders of the day. Chapter 6 opens with Micah telling the people to listen to what God says, and then goes on to share God essentially calling everyone out for their failure to be faithful to God.

I want to share another story written by Stephanie Thompson and published in my daily devotions Walking in Grace:

“A few years ago, I received my Bible Study Fellowship (BSF) assignment - volunteer co-leader for the young toddler class. Our children’s program made it convenient for mothers of preschoolers to attend, but our class was more than childcare, with a

curriculum that included singing specific hymns eight times during the year.

My instinct was to sing catchier, more age-appropriate songs to these fifteen month old babies. It seemed pointless, but I reluctantly followed the program that BSF headquarters had set in place. I plopped on the floor and sang. “Holy, Holy, Holy.” The class sat around me and stared without comprehension. First written as a poem by Reginald Heber, bishop of Calcutta, more than two hundred years ago, Heber’s widow found the verse among her husband’s papers after he passed. Thirty-five years later, a music publisher re-discovered the four-stanza poem, put it to a melody, and in 1861 created the popular Christian hymn.

‘Holy, holy, holy! Lord God Almighty!
Early in the morning our song shall rise to thee.
Holy, holy, holy! Merciful and mighty,
God in three persons, blessed Trinity!’

Months into the BSF year, a young mother lingered in our doorway after class. She shared how while running errands, a toddler’s voice sang, “Holy, holy, holy, Lord God all mine be,” from the back seat. I smiled. That antiquated hymn was still relevant today - even for toddlers. “

Dear God, I may not always understand your ways, but help me walk in them.... Amen.

Ouch. I remember my Old Testament professor telling us that being a prophet of God usually meant you were headed for a much shorter life—kings and people in power do not take kindly to anyone who threatens their power and it often results in the perceived threat being permanently removed. I don't remember how long Micah lived, but if this is what God had him saying, I can't imagine it was for too long.

Ultimately, Micah reminds God's people that while proper obedience is important—making the right offerings and sacrifices was good, worshiping God properly was good—what God desires more than our right and proper actions is our right and proper hearts. As Lutherans, our denominational doctrine strongly rejects works righteousness or the belief that we can earn our salvation through doing good works. We do not earn salvation through what we perceive as proper worship, but rather through God's abundant and freely given grace.

This isn't to say that we want to be sloppy in our worship. All of us in worship leadership at St. Andrews work hard and are deeply intentional in what we do in worship each week. Things are not haphazardly thrown together. In fact, I often find myself working through each week's logistics as I get ready for bed or wake up in the morning. Everything that happens in worship is intentional and is grounded in our tradition as Christians of the Lutheran variety.

Summer worship is an opportunity for us to embrace what we might otherwise avoid. Instead of seeing it as an obstacle to our right and proper worship, how might we approach it as an opening to deepening our relationship with God? Instead of being frustrated that we don't "get" what we want each week, how might we experience the sweetness of God's faithfulness through a variety of practices?

Worship in its most basic definition is to gather around the means of grace. I was taught that all we need for worship is to proclaim the word and celebrate the sacraments. All the other parts that we include are beautiful, meaningful, and significant, but they are not essential for us to worship God.

What is essential? To love justice, do kindness, and to go humbly with our God.

St. Andrew's Cares Fund

The St. Andrew's Cares Fund has been hard at work, with a big uptick in assistance requests. We've provided 24 Walmart gift cards just this year alone. Each guest is allowed one gift card a month, and can receive up to three gift cards in a calendar year. I also share resources provided by the county and PADS that are available for people experiencing chronic homelessness and food insecurity. My hope is that folks will seek long-term solutions to their chronic needs.

Since this is a discretionary fund outside of our general budget, I occasionally ask for donations directly to the Cares Fund. We are getting low on resources due to the increased needs of our community. In order to keep things as equal as possible, I am only asking for financial donations. Please do not donate gift cards as we are no longer able to use them with our Cares' guests.

Thank you for all your generosity to this ministry--while our support is small, our community appreciates that St. Andrew's cares.

St. Andrew Accountability

In order to improve our accounting practices, we will be making a slight shift to the Designated Giving Accounts as they appear on our online giving platform (Vanco). As it stands, many of our designated accounts do not have a direct expense line item, so money coming in designated to those funds are very difficult to ensure they then come out of the same designation.

The offering envelopes will remain the same for the time being and we will continue to have the online options of General Operating Fund, ELCA World Hunger, and Benevolence. You can always make a gift and specify what it’s for in the memo line—Quilters, Youth, Building Maintenance, etc. Our bookkeeper has the ability to account for these specified gifts within the general operating budget.

All this means is that we’re cleaning up our accounting practices to reflect how we use your faithful gifts. Nothing will change for you, but we wanted to let you know since some of the options will look different.

24 Sarah was amused and overjoyed at the birth of Isaac in her old age: “God has brought laughter for me; everyone who hears will laugh with me” (Genesis 21:6). Give praise and thanks to God for shaking up our lives and rewarding us when we least expect it.

25 Thank God for the work of the Spirit, which leads us to Christ, equips us to be faithful disciples and deepens our understanding of God’s wisdom and ways throughout our life.

26 Remember in prayer high school students gathering for the Lutheran Summer Music Academy & Festival at Valparaiso University in Indiana. Ask God to bless their time together as they further their knowledge and skills and prepare for future careers and vocations.

27 Pray for adult children who are caregivers for their parents, that they will have resources and support that help inform, guide and sustain their work of love.

28 Give thanks for our confessions of faith, which remind us that we are children of God and followers of Christ, rooted in Scripture and united by our beliefs with a diverse and global community of faith.

29 Ask God to help us bear compassion, joy and hope into a world yearning for peace, stability and meaningful connection.

30 Sharing our faith in Christ and serving our neighbors in need can be challenging, tiring and even intimidating. Ask the Spirit to reassure us that God is with us, giving us the wisdom, strength, courage and patience to do God’s work in the world.

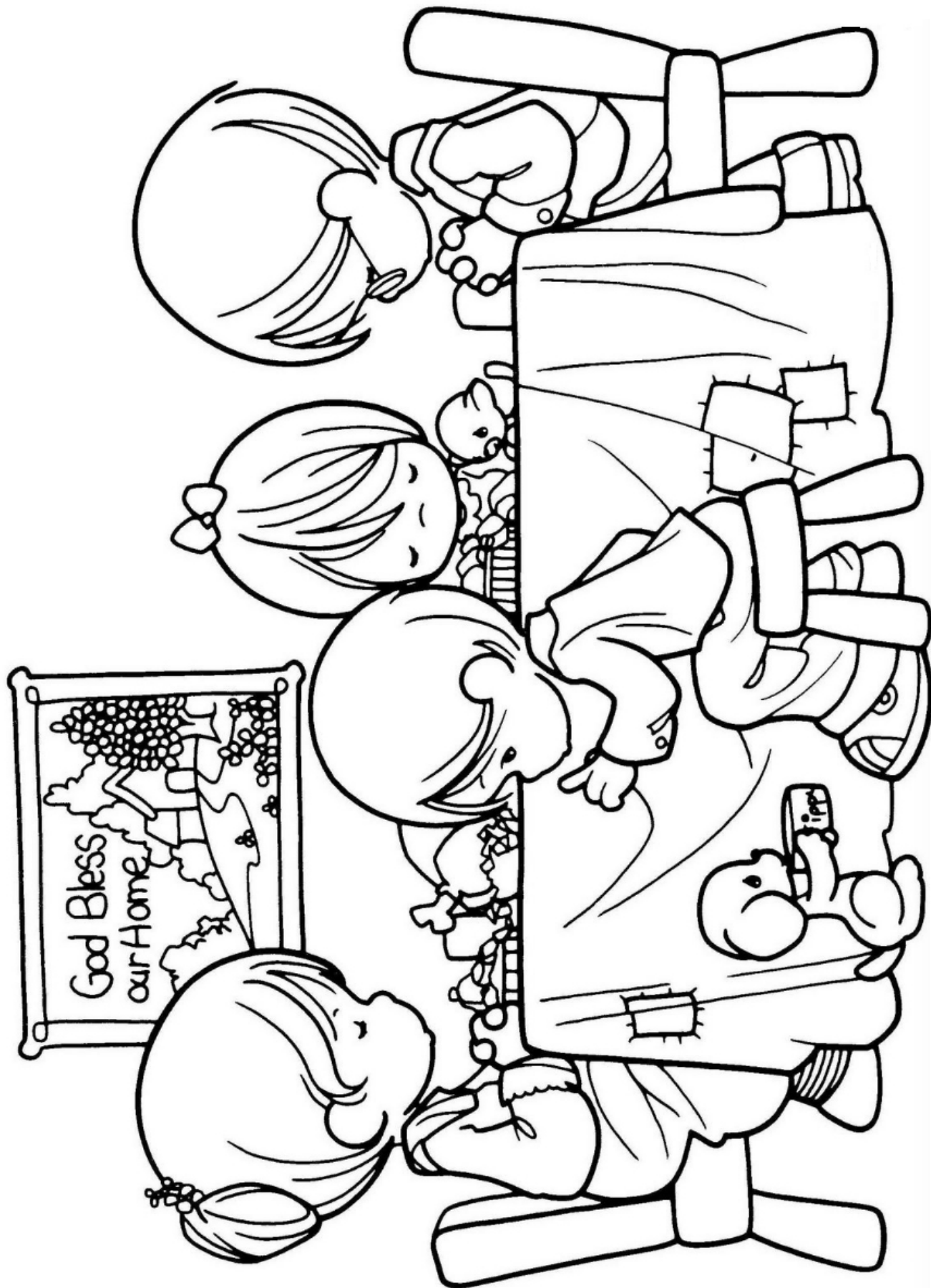
