With no major church events to focus on, we can turn our attention to intentionally living out what God has called us to as the beloved community of Christ.

Wherever your summer journeys might take you, we remember that in God every day is extraordinary, and that God is with us every moment of the way.

## Wellness and Harmony

We have survived a Pandemic – something none of us thought we would see or experience in our lifetime. In the midst of that pandemic, we welcomed a new pastor at St. Andrew. Her first few years were spent guiding our church through some "never been done before" changes! What I am most proud of is the way our congregation adjusted to these changes. What I also respect, is Pastor Jenna's resiliency throughout these changes.

A recent national survey showed that 80% of adults said they intend to be more mindful about practicing self-care after the pandemic. The definition of wellness is individual, but in general, wellness includes: Better health, better fitness, improved nutrition, enhanced appearances, better sleep and a more mindful approach to stress.

Employers across the country are having to adjust their cultures to include safety, wellness and work/ life harmony. Investing in these strategies will benefit not only the employee, but the but the organization for which they work. I recently attended a seminar that focused retention strategies for clergy (the Spiritual Care Department at Northwestern Medicine hospitals report to me) and it made me ponder how we are doing in supporting our own Pastor Jenna. Here are some of the notes from that seminar on how to manage stress and resilience for effective ministry but can be used by any one of us:



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## **STEWARDSHIP** — God's Work/Our Hands, Hearts and Lives as Disciples of Christ Jesus

As we enjoy summer and our break from school year activities, even though we take breaks for vacations, the church is still open and St. Andrew is looking to expand our "People Power"! We are looking for volunteers to help with our worship services - altar guild, communion assistant, ushers, lay readers, assisting minister, media techs. There is a sign up sheet in the narthex or PLEASE talk to Pastor Jenna or Anita about these exciting and fulfilling opportunities. WE EACH CAN MAKE A DIFFERENCE EVEN IF WE DO A SMALL PART! As Pastor Jenna said in her message last Sunday, we should be "taking responsibility for God's credibility". "My family sat on our back porch and listened to the night song. The serenade of frogs broke through twilight's haze.

'We could be at the old house,' my husband said. 'The sound takes me back.'

'It's close,' I said. 'But there's a breeze. My wind chimes would be tingling.'

There was only the melody of creation until fourteen-

year-old Gabriel spoke. 'What happened to the chimes, Mom? They were on the front porch of the old house my whole life.'

I shared that the chimes had broken in a harsh wind and were put in the shed. In the stretched-long process of moving, who knew what happened to the pieces and parts.

'That's sad,' he said.

A few weeks later, my family filled our plates and headed to the back porch to share breakfast. I heard the chimes as soon as I sat on our rusty glider. A smile that spoke a million words broke over my most quiet son's face. 'I found the pieces, Mom,' he said. 'Mostly. I replaced the sail with wood. It's like our home now. Old mixed with new.'

I could hardly breathe.

Gabriel is my fixer, working wonders with his hands. He mends the broken and builds things new. It's a talent the Lord gave him. But then there's his spiritual gift. Gabiel is a servant. He was intentional in weaving cord through metal and wood to create a balance that was just right.

He cared for my soul.

I hugged Gabriel tight as the breeze chimed a song of love."

- 1) Be intentional about health and well-being promotion
  - a. Daily!
  - b. Exercise (regular exer cise is linked to better mental health)
- c. Spiritual practices (prayer, bible reading, meditation)



- d. Relational Activities (time with family and friends)
- e. Leisurely Activities (fishing, hiking, golf)
- 2) Participating in God's Work and Emphasizing Process over Outcome
  - a. See your work as God's work or a calling rather than merely a participant in that work.
  - b. The process of ministry is often emphasized over "results".
    - i. Practically this is said to begin and end with prayer.
- 3) Having a Bounded approach to Ministry/Work
  - a. Proactively create boundaries between work life and homefamily life
  - b. Creating boundaries allows for fulfillment of family obligations as well as to help with engaging in health and well-being promoting practices
  - c. Practically, this can look like:
    - i. Weekly Sabbaths
    - ii. Annual Vacation time
    - iii. Sabbaticals
    - iv. Fixed Office Hours
    - v. Not taking calls at home after a certain time (unless in emergencies)
    - vi. Delineating clergy's role and responsibilities from those of lay leaders and staff
    - vii. Manage phone and email so they don't manage you!

As I sat through this seminar, it occurred to me that Pastor Jenna does many of these practices to ensure she is fully with our church when needed, but also caring for her and her family's well-being. Praying all of you can do the same...I know many of these practices are included in my attempt at life/work harmony. Be well!

## PRAYER VENTURES July 2023

- Give thanks for the work of social service organizations, ELCA Disability Ministry and the Total Inclusion! initiative of Lutheran Outdoor Ministries to fully include, affirm and respond to the diverse needs of people who live with a range of physical, cognitive and emotional disabilities.
- Pray that we will equip one another for the challenges and share with one another the blessings that come from being disciples of Jesus, called and sent to do God's work in the world.
- Remember in prayer all those who have been impacted by disasters, including those related to extreme weather, climate change, economic upheaval, political unrest, and war, and by other events that cause suffering, loss and displacement.
- Independence Day Give thanks for the freedom and abundance we enjoy in our country, and ask God to help us exercise generosity in our national life, addressing root causes of the poverty, hunger, injustice, racism and lack of opportunity our neighbors experience on a daily basis.
- Pray for the worship leaders and musicians gathering in Philadelphia for the conference of the Association of Lutheran Church Musicians.
- So far in 2023 there have been over 18,500 gun violence deaths in our country, including 280 mass shooting incidents (gunviolencearchive. org). Ask God to hear our cries of grief and anger; pray for the comfort, healing and strength of individuals, families and communities suffering sorrow and trauma; and ask the Spirit's strength to do all we can to prevent gun violence.
- Praise God that sin and death have no control over our lives now that we have been set free by God's unearned gift of grace and forgiveness in Jesus Christ.

- Thank God for the ELCA's special relationship with the United Methodist Church, a full communion partner since 2009. Pray for the church, its members and its leaders, that together we will find strength and resources for the work of sharing the gospel and serving our neighbor.
- "Come to me, all you that are weary and are carrying heavy burdens, and I will give you rest" (Matthew 11:28). Pray with relief and gratitude that we are never alone or without a loving rabbi, instructing and rejuvenating us to navigate life as followers of Christ.
- 10 Ask God to guide and bless the Truth and Healing Movement of our church, an initiative to increase our understanding of past and present injustices and harm borne by Indigenous people and to encourage action to build right and healthy relationships, healing Indigenous and non-Indigenous people alike.
- 11 Thank God for inspiring our generosity to new congregations and ministries, especially in places that lack the resources for growth and self-sufficiency.
- 12 "Help us to put aside the angry word, the clenching fist, the wish and will to hurt. Teach us the way in which love is best served" (ELW 615). Pray that we will treat our neighbors including our enemies with a kindness and respect that delight God.
- 13 Give thanks for the ELCA's Resourceful Servants initiative, which promotes the financial wellness of ELCA congregations, rostered ministers and seminarians; lessens the strains on those who lead faith communities; and enables them to more effectively carry out the mission of the church making disciples for Jesus Christ.
- 14 God is gracious and good to all and has compassion for all creation. Pray for God to help us spread the good news throughout the world and to every generation.

- 15 Ask the Spirit to guide and inspire those planning the 2024 ELCA Youth Gathering, the Multicultural Youth Leadership Event, the tAble event (for youth living with physical, cognitive and emotional disabilities) and the Young Adult Gathering.
- 16 Pray for patience when our ministry doesn't produce the results we expect; ask the Spirit to help us reflect on our work, adapt, and understand that sometimes positive results ensue without our knowledge.
- 17 Pray for rostered ministers gathering with colleagues from across the church for fellowship, renewal, continuing education, worship and Bible study at the ELCA Rostered Ministers Gathering in Phoenix, Ariz.
- 18 Remember in prayer members of the Commission for a Renewed Lutheran Church as they reconsider statements of purpose for each expression of the ELCA and the principles of our church's organizational structure.
- 19 Lift up prayers of joy and thanksgiving, for God has given us new life, freedom and an eternal inheritance through the risen Christ a gift for all people!
- 20 Give thanks, today and every day, for those who stir our joy and hope, and resolve to be a source of joy and hope for others.
- 21 Doing God's work in the world and sharing the gospel is never a fruitless endeavor God accomplishes what God intends. Pray for the Spirit to deepen our trust in God's power and renew our strength for continuing the important work to which God has called us.
- 22 Pray that, together, we will always work to identify and encourage potential leaders, deacons and pastors, so that they might respond to God's call and use their gifts to share the gospel, nurture congregations, grow the church and serve our neighbors in need.
- 23 Pray for wisdom to discern good from evil, and for faith to know God's truth reigns.

- 24 The brutality and destruction of the Russia-Ukraine War have gone on for over a year. Pray for a permanent end to the violence, and remember in prayer people of all ages who yearn for peace and normality.
- 25 Pray that we will not judge or disparage people whose religious beliefs differ from our own or who belong to no community of faith. Promise to trust the work of the Spirit when listening to our neighbors, responding to their questions and opinions and inviting them to embrace the gift of unconditional love we experience through Jesus Christ.
- 26 "Teach me your way, O Lord, that I may walk in your truth" (Psalm 86:11). Pray that, as disciples and students of Christ, we will attend to the truth of God and what the Spirit may reveal anew.
- 27 Citizens of Louisville Organized and United Together (CLOUT), an ELCA World Hunger Domestic Hunger Grant partner, has assisted in providing over 4,200 units of safe and affordable housing in Louisville, Ky. Give thanks for what we accomplish together when we share our gifts and resources!
- 28 Pray for those whose mental and physical pain goes unnoticed in our communities and congregations; ask the Spirit to help us reach out to them with care, support and respect.
- 29 Give thanks and praise to God, who knows us inside and out and guides and supports us throughout our journey.
- 30 "Neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor rulers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord" (Romans 8:38-39). Thank God for this sweeping proclamation, which gives us peace and assurance in this uncertain world.
- 31 Pray for the Spirit to refresh and sustain the health, spirit and faith of young adult staff and their leaders as they serve in our summer camp ministries across the country.

### St. Andrew's Cares

Many times during a month individuals and families come to our church with real needs.

The St. Andrew's Cares Fund has been hard at work, with a big uptick in assistance requests. We've provided 24 Walmart gift cards just this year alone. Each guest is allowed one gift card a month, and can receive up to three gift cards in a calendar year. I also share resources provided by the county and PADS that are available for people experiencing chronic homelessness and food insecurity. My hope is that folks will seek long-term solutions to their chronic needs.

Since this is a discretionary fund outside of our general budget, I occasionally ask for donations directly to the Cares Fund. We are getting low on resources due to the increased needs of our community. In order to keep things as equal as possible, I am only asking for financial donations.

Please do not donate gift cards as we St. Andrew Lutheran are no longer able to use them with a lift church with a lift mission our Cares' guests.

Thank you for all your generosity to this ministry--while our support is small, our community appreciates that St. Andrew's cares.
